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Excitement is building as we look forward to the 25th anniversary of the day East Lake Community Library first opened its doors, November 1, 1999. This fall, there will be a number of special events to commemorate and celebrate that auspicious event, and I hope everyone will participate in some way. There is no way to adequately describe the positive impact ELCL has had in the lives of area residents in its first quarter of a century, but I know without a doubt it is HUGE!

Looking back at the library's history, it is important to note that its inception can be traced back to a few years before the physical building arose and greeted its first patrons. Before there was an East Lake Community Library there was a group of ladies with a dream. Even though voters in the East Lake area rejected a proposal to create a taxsupported library in 1988 and again in 1990, the East Lake Community Council, led by Mary Anne Schmidt, formed a task force to create an East Lake Community Library, and in May 1993 the library opened in a donated vacant store front in the Shoppes of Boot Ranch thank to the tireless commitment of Mary Anne Schmidt, Judy Nobles, Marianne Wayne and Cheryl Corrente. Sheila McCloud, a retired librarian from Toronto, helped with cataloging and setting up procedure as did Estelle Riley, the Oldsmar librarian. Other members of the East Lake community joined in donating chairs, shelves, tables, a card catalog and—of course—books! The store-front library was open 42 hours a week, and two months after opening, there were 90 volunteers, adult and children's programming and shelves were stocked with over 20,000 books! Not one penny of public dollars had been spent.

The library's board was organized and ready to secure funding for the endeavor, but unfortunately they received news they would have to move locations. Again, volunteers packed up everything, and local businesses provided trucks, funding and labor to move the library to an open store front in Woodlands Square where it reopened in October 1993. Talks continued through 1994 with the Pinellas Public Library Cooperative (PPLC) and county government officials who were verbally supportive but would not find any funding to help the little Community Library. By 1995 the library board experienced

Beyond the Stacks

Summer is here and it's not just hot dogs on the grill that are sizzling! Please remember the library offers programs, services and just a respite from the heat if you need a place to work or relax and get out of the heat and humidity. And summertime at ELCL is not just for kids—there's a plethora of programs for adults as well, including a summer reading club with weekly prizes and a variety of clubs and health and wellness programs.

In an effort to keep everyone updated, there are several important changes coming soon. Thanks to Pinellas County funding, the library's outdated lighting fixtures in the older parts of the building are being replaced by bright, energy-efficient LED panels sometime in the next few months. Because of the extensive work, **the library will be closed Tuesday, August 6 – Friday, August 9.** We will provide updates as to holds, etc., but safety is our prime concern. Another exciting addition will be the advent of **Certifix LiveScan fingerprinting services** at the library. ELCL will be the only library in Pinellas County to offer this service and the only location along the East Lake corridor in Palm Harbor. East Lake Community Library continues to be "The Little Engine That Could!"

Summer hours will continue through August 10, with early openings every day but Thursdays. **Beginning August 12, normal operating hours will resume.** Remember the 24/7 locker system and outdoor book drops are always available when the library is closed.

Looking ahead to the fall, there will be several special events to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of ELCL. These included a Roaring 20s-themed **Murder Myster Dinner fundraiser** at Wentworth Country Club on Saturday, November 2. **The BIG 25th Anniversary Celebration will be on Saturday, November 8,** with contests, activities, entertainment and, of course, a huge cake—and it's all FREE to thank community members for their years of support. Just a reminder—the deadline to enter the commemorative library card contest is July 31. Winners will receive gift cards and recognition at the

25th Anniversary Celebration and will have their design imprinted on commemorative library cards. For further information, check the ELCL website, the library newsletter or call the front desk.



Though many locations were considered such as portable buildings near the East Lake Fire Department station or space in East Lake High School with access after the school day for the patrons, agreements could not be reached. became "homeless" and closed for business for the time being. Subsequently, however, public Nobles announced, "The library is not folding. on East Lake Road and funding as well as matching funds from the state. Construction began, and East Lake Community Library finally opened in

the Pinellas Public Library Cooperative (PPLC), also assisting financially and in other ways, with able to help. Did you know?....

- ◆ ANDREW CARNEGIE founder of U.S. Steel Corporation, was responsible for the funding and building of 2,509 libraries around the globe. 1,795 of them in the United States. It is reported that during his lifetime, Carnegie gave away more than\$350 million.
- THE WORD LIBRARY comes from the Latin word "liber", the term for the inner bark of trees. It was first used in written form in the 14th century.
- NOTARY SERVICES held are offered by East Lake Community Library at a cost of \$8 per document or "stamp". There are two notaries on staff, and it is best to call ahead to make sure one of them will be available at the desired date and time. If a verification of signature is required, so not sign the document until in the presence of the notary.
